Grammers Earn Ohio Distinguished Service Award

Members of the Ohio Jersey Breeders Association (OJBA) gathered for their annual meeting on January 24, 2015. More than 100 Jersey enthusiast met at the Der-Dutchman in Plain City, to honor peers, tend to business, and learn more about industry topics.

Bill and Debbie Grammer, Sebring, were recognized with the state's most prestigious award, Pioneer Service Award. The couple operates a 1,000-cow Registered Jersey dairy with their children Billy, Ben, and Jenni, in Northeast, Ohio.

Although the farm he grew up on, began with Guernseys, Jerseys were incorporated into the herd shortly after Bill graduated from the Ohio State University (OSU) in 1978. After college, Bill worked for a grain merchandiser in Cincinnati. Bill and Debbie officially joined the family business with the purchase of the farm from Bill's parents and a receipt of their first milk check shortly after they were married in 1992. Today the Grammer's raise corn and forages on the farm's 182 acres with an additional 300 acres of rented land in Ohio, and another 320 acres of custom-farmed corn and cotton in Texas

The Grammer's have been recognized nationally for high Genomic JPI animals with 21 cows on the March 2015, Top 1.5% list. As a result of their high numbers more than 1,000 animals have been marketed throughout the United States and Panama with numerous bulls also sent to A.I. organizations.

In addition to Bill's commitment on the farm, his overwhelming enthusiasm for Jerseys has motivated him to advocate and serve alongside various organizations. Grammer served two terms as director. with the American Jersey Cattle Association. During his time as director Bill was the finance and development committee chair and vice president of the National All-Jersey Board. He also served on the board of the Ohio Jersey Breeders Association. Currently, he is a member on the Columbiana-Mahoning DHIA committee, where he has served several terms as president. Bill also is vice-president of DHI Cooperative board and represents District 5 on COBA's board of directors. Bill's enthusiasm for Jerseys has garnished him with opportunities to serve on the Ohio Dairy Producers Board, the Smith Dairy Producer Advisory Committee, West & Knox Insurance Board and the Ag Credit Advisory Committee.

He is a freshman at West Virginia University studying Agricultural Business. On the farm, Ben owns 15 cows, seven heifers, and three bulls. With two of his cows having contract matings from Alta Genetics.

As a 10 year 4-H member, Ben served as president and vice-president of his club. He also participated in dairy judging, quiz bowl, and was honored with a gold rating for the Ohio 4-H Dairy Achievement contest.

Ben was the president of his local FFA Chapter and he received the Star Farmer award and, as well as getting the chapter's outstanding junior member award. He was also president and served as a participant in the local Ruritan activities including

Currently she has two cows and four heifers which she has exhibited at county and state fairs. As a 4-H member Michael was the Ohio Dairy Achievement winner. With Ohio 4-H, Molly was an ambassador and member of the teen advisory council. She also represented Ohio at the National 4-H Conference. In her county, Molly is a member of the junior leader program, junior fair board, and camp counselor volunteer group.

Kadey Starkey, Mechanicsburg, received the Diley Family Memorial Award. This award is presented to an Ohio Jersey Junior member that exemplifies character and dedication towards the progression of the Jersey Industry. Since then her herd has grown to nearly 50 Jerseys, Holsteins and Brown Swiss through sale purchases and reproduction. In the National Jersey Youth Production Contest at Louisville Allison has had two Pot O' Gold animals place in the top 20 to receive cash awards. She has exhibited animals at local, state and national shows. Allison was an active member of the 4-H and FFA serving as an officer and participating in dairy judging. Allison is a recipient of her American FFA Degree has won the state Dairy Handing and Beginning Prepared Public speaking contests.

Mangun is active in Freshwater Community Church, serving in the past as a youth leader and participating in mission trips to Haiti, Chile, Virginia, and Pennsylvania.

Business Meeting

Allison Ryan, the industry relations manager for American Dairy Association (ADA) Mideast, brought the group upto-date of the dairy industry's check-off program. She began by recognizing Erin Williams as a new staff member of ADA. Seven key partnerships are key players in the fast food industry continue to be a focus to promote consumption of dairy product. The goal is to increase fluid milk

sales by providing dairy options with less sugar, more protein and calcium, and a longer shelf life.

Ryan encouraged producers to promote and donate to the Great American Milk Drive, a program designed to eliminate the shortage of milk provided at local food banks. Through donations at local grocery stores and online at www.milklife.com/give America has donated nearly 292,383 gallons of milk to people in need of dairy products.

Allison explained that ADA is continuing to build relations with health officials to provide more educational material that will explain the benefits of milk while countering misinformation.

This year at the Ohio Spring Dairy Expo, ADA will once again sponsor a meal and youth showmanship program. At the Ohio State fair they will continue to support the cheese sale at the Sale of Champions.

JR Kaverman, South Charleston, talked about the Ohio Purebred Dairy Cattle Association (PDCA). He informed breeders that the PDCA judging school will now be held during the first week of the Ohio State Fair instead of Spring Dairy Expo. He encouraged everyone to join and become active members of PDCA.

Angi Kaverman, South Charleston, relayed details about the Ohio State Fair. The junior Jersey show will be held on August 6, with Pat Conroy, Angola, Ind., serving as official. The open show for heifers will be on August 7 and the open show for cows and the futurity will be on August 8. Steve Borland, Ormstown, Que., will judge the open show. Both shows start at 9 a.m. The second annual dairy feeder show will be held from August 3-5.

Neal Smith, Executive Secretary for the American Jersey Association, informed breeders of the outstanding growth within the Jersey business. He was excited for Ohio to be hosting the annual meeting, and celebration of the 150th anniversary of the oldest breed association in United States—American Jersey Cattle Association—in 2018. The World Jersey Cattle Bureau will also host its world conference in conjunction with the meetings. Neal spoke of the improvements to the Genetic Base Equivalent and the JPI formula, which will put more emphasis on fertility traits.

Neal also informed breeders that the AJCA and National All-Jersey Inc., is supporting the Referendum on Federal Order Issues which will provide Jersey farmers greater opportunities for growth and sustainability.
